Roger Petering

One hundred persons helped welcome Roger Petering (class of 1952) into the Greenhills Hall of Fame on July 3, 2011.

Roger's parents Ralph and Margaret (both deceased) raised their five wonderful children on Brompton and Burnham. Bill and Mary Margaret are deceased, Barbara lives in Greenhills, Ron in Dayton, and Roger in Middletown. He and Sue (Bergen '56) have three children: Kurt and Don in Colorado and John in Middletown. They have three grandchildren and enjoy visits to Colorado very much. Middletown is home now.

His father was the manager of the CO-OP/IGA store for about twenty-five years. He was such a pleasant, kind man. Ralph was also very active in the community. He belonged to Kiwanis, the American Legion, the Holy Name Society and served on the Greenhills Credit Union Board. Roger's sweet mother was a member of the St. Ann's Society, and I remember her for her happy, bubbly personality and a wonderful smile that always seemed to be a part of her that never faded.

In high school, Roger was on the Greenhills track and football teams and on the Shamrock staff. After graduation, he went to the University of Cincinnati and was graduated in 1958 with a degree in Economics. He became a member of the newly formed Greenhills Athletic Boosters while at U.C. He remembers meeting at my parents' Ingram Rd. home and some of the original members: Bert Fridman, Marv Huber, Clint Ritter, Charlie Jacob, and Bill Jeckell. Among many "unusual" fundraisers, he recalled a horse show on Bill Lape's farm and enough money was made to start the first eighth grade Greenhills football team in the late 50's.

When asked about a high school memory, he said, "Many good ones!" The worst was when I was a senior on the football team. We were playing Wyoming. (Greenhills arch rival) We had a 13-0 lead when I dropped a punt on our own 10 yard line. Wyoming recovered it inside our 10. That fumble turned the tide, and they went on to defeat us 32-19. I never forgot that!"

The adults who made an impact in his life were his dad, Tim Newell, and Russell Schuster, a science teacher.

Fond memories include the pool, the school, the woods, and "fishin' in the creek. "The community spirit was high on his list of memories."

He couldn't think of a funny memory, but I've got one to share. When we first moved to Greenhills, I was not a "happy camper" as I only had six months to go before I would be a Columbus West High graduate. Mother and I were walking in front of the grocery store when two very handsome, young guys were walking toward us. After they passed us, Mother trying to boost my sagging morale said, "Well Judy, if all the young men of Greenhills look like those two, you should like it here quite well!" I found out later on that they were

Joe Cushing and Roger Petering and oh yes, they were already spoken for. No wonder- they were good-lookers!

Roger served in the Ohio Air National Guard, the 123rd Air Control and Warning Squadron.

He owned his own accounting and tax practice for 35 years and fully retired in 2005.

He was a charter member of St. Mathias Catholic Church in Forest Park where he served on the finance committee and as an usher for 31 years. He also served on the Princeton High School Scholarship Committee.

Roger was a youth soccer coach in Springdale for four years, and he was a member of Springdale's Lions Club for ten years and also downtown Cincinnati's Lions Club. (A service organization for the visually impaired.)

He has been an active and devoted member of the GHHS Alumni group along with his wife Sue. They currently assist in the preparation of the Alum's Newsletter. They have spent endless hours in the Alumni Room cleaning, sorting, rearranging, etc. One of his terrific contributions was the fantastic Hall of Fame Photo Wall.

To describe Roger in a few words could be: A man of perpetual motion, Superman's brother. He never lands in one spot for long.

He's also an accomplished water color artist -- in his "spare time" maybe!?!?

When asked how he felt about this honor, he responded, "Never for one second did I expect it, but it's wonderful to know that others did. I have received many, many congratulations."

Welcome to the Hall of Fame. You're now on the wall you created. (One question "Rog" -- how did you sit still long enough for the great photo of you?)

Roger's nomination criteria continues in the following letter written by Edwin DeGroot (North College Hill School Class of 1953) who nominated him for this honor.

My nomination of Roger Petering was based on Criteria No. 4 of the GHS Alumni Hall of Fame Criteria. (Praiseworthy service to church/community and/or government.)

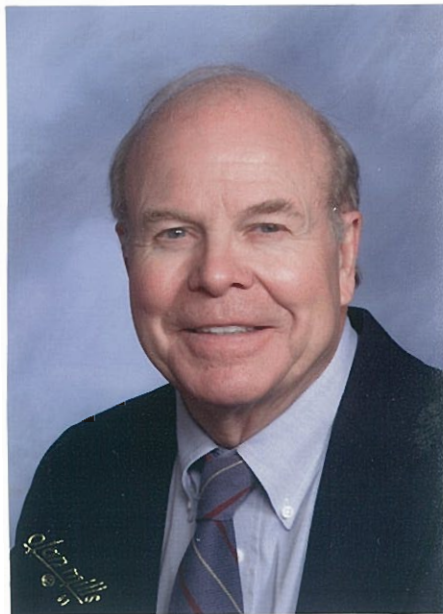
The unselfish contribution of his time to collaborate and cooperate with other GHS graduates, including his wife, Sue, to preserve the traditions and memories of Greenhills High School during this extended period manifest his genuine interest in GHS and the community in which he grew up. Clearly, Roger may have physically moved from Greenhills after starting his own family with Sue (Bergen) Petering in the 1950's, but mentally and emotionally he never left. He is irrevocably tethered to memories of his Greenhills classmates and friends.

Some individuals have talents and opportunities that enable them to achieve “notable” accomplishments, however defined, or make an “impact on the world.” Although Roger’s talents have done neither, he has made a difference on a smaller scale in the Greenhills community and in the lives of GHS Alumni. He has a talent (propensity) for sharing, often with humor, anecdotal stories about growing up in Greenhills and experiences with GHS friends, -- Jim and Lois O’Connor, Lee Newell, Tom Smith, Charlie Shipp, Rich Voiers, Jack Kearney, Ed Wesley, Ron Loebker, Stan Wernz, Jack Randolph, Deann Young, George Mann, Andy Lechler, Bob Dinkerlacker and others, including Coach Rex Hoon.

Roger may not be a “hero” (except perhaps to his family), but the friends in his historical reminiscing are. Significantly, it is always with pride, not envy, that he recounts their achievements - - in athletics, education, business, aviation, science, medicine and the military. Most of what I know about the above Greenhills graduates I learned from Roger, who delights in making others the stars, super achievers and heroes.

One thing is certain: If you spend enough time with Roger, you will surely know a lot about Greenhills history, GHS, and the people he admires and respects.

For over 50 years, Roger has sustained an incredible level of loyalty, support and enthusiasm, for the important things in his life, such as family, church, community and, of course, Greenhills and GHS. In doing so, he has become a distinguished citizen and GHS graduate. By Edwin DeGroot



Hall of Fame 2011

Terence “Terry” Kollman

Owen Frakes (GHS class of 1961) nominated Terry for this honor. I would like to quote in part from Owen’s nomination letter before my comments.

Quote: “Terence Kollman, class of 1960, is a “true” Greenhills Pioneer in every way. He completely reflects the unique and substantive values and opportunities that being raised in Greenhills provided all of us. The sense of community and service he experienced growing up in Greenhills are still with him today.

Terry’s accomplishments and honors academically, athletically, musically, and in student government are numerous. Terry was not only well-rounded but “set the bar high” for himself and others and then consistently performed at the highest levels in every area, not only as a participant, but as an organized and dynamic leader of those organizations. He not only epitomizes consistency and high standards, but also moral values, loyalty, stick-to-itiveness and generosity, and a sincere interest in all people. The values Terry believed in were nurtured, not only by his parents, but were strongly enforced each day by being a native son of the wonderful community of Greenhills. He has proven and continues to be an outstanding ambassador, a high energy and tireless worker/leader for every business and community he serves. He loves and cherishes his Greenhills High School roots and what they continue to mean to his personal and professional lives.” - End of quote.

Terry’s parents, Art and Frances Kollman, were early 1938 “Pioneers”, and Terry was their only child (born in 1942) of which he says, “Sometimes it was good, but sometimes I wish I had a brother.” Home was on Avenell Lane. Both are in Heaven now: Art (1972) and Fran (1989). Both were great community citizens. Art was the captain of the Greenhills Fire Dept., and he was the “Supervisor” of the turkey and ham booths at the carnivals. Terry recalled how much fun he had watching his dad acting like a carnival barker at the Greenhills Fireman’s Booth. Art was the rental officer for the first properties in 1937 and 1938 before the village was founded.

In my researching, I found this information on Dad Art in the April 14, 1939, *Greenhills News Bulletin* describing sketches of some of the various employees of the village management office. Quote: “Art Kollman – attended St. George High School & U.C. Formerly with the Crocker Wheeler Manufacturing Co. attending Columbia and Newark Tech at night. Later with an insurance company in Cincinnati. Was employed in the construction division of Farm Security Administration in 1936. He was later transferred to the management staff handling house assignments. He was known as the “Keeper of the Keys” and is one of the inspirations of the pet owners’ club.” -End of quote. This is just one example of the wonderful, dedicated (highly screened) persons who helped mold and make Greenhills into a unique community and produce offspring who carried and still carry on that “Pioneer Spirit”.

Terry said his mother was a “mean” bridge player and enjoyed being on the Greenhills Country Club Tennis Team. (No word that she had a “mean” serve.)

He spent K in the Community School Auditorium, grades 1-3 at St. Vivian’s, and back to Greenhills for grades 4-12. During his school years, he was busy building his character that would stay with him to day.

His favorite high school teacher was Frances Sedge. She advised him he could go to any college and choose any course he wanted. That’s exactly what he did.

During his high school years, he was one busy guy. He was the All State 1960 Mile Relay Team (track), Junior Class President, President of the entire student body in his senior year, President of the State of Ohio’s highest-rated perennial Concert Band, a trumpet player in the Greenhills Concert Band, in Glee Club, and a Varsity basketball player. During his senior year, he made multiple touchdowns on the football team which made him a Top 20 scoring football halfback that year. One might wonder how with all this activity he had time to study. He did and made the National Honor Society.

Upon graduation, he went to the University of Notre Dame and was graduated in 1964 with a BA degree in Communication Arts/Marketing. He became an executive with Leo Burnett (world’s fourth largest advertising agency out of Chicago.)

Terry has always been a pioneer in all that he has done whether in marketing, advertising or media work. He can be described easily as an entrepreneur, founder, and financier. (Space limitations won’t allow the long list of all he has done, but some are still going strong today.) He founded and financed Pro Media Advertising, Charter Direct Marketing, and Charter Digital (President /CEO of all). He was Executive Producer of the first “Danny Thomas/St. Jude Hospital Telethon” which raised over a million dollars, and Vice President of Public Broadcasting Marketing to name a few.

Terry met the love of his life Synda on a blind date at an NBC party in L.A. and currently lives in Boca Raton Fla. They have been married 34 happy years and have two children Christopher and Candice and four grandkids Kyle, Kevin, Patrick, and Nathaniel.

Memories of Greenhills are many and happy. As he looked back, he felt it was utopia. He appreciated being able to bike, and walk everywhere, hanging out at the drug store, and the nearest basketball court to shoot a few with Owen Frakes & Tom MacDonald. Building forts and camps in Winton Woods with Mik Brown & Rick Koehler were every boy’s dream. “Greenhills to him was a ‘real gem’ and ‘growing up’ in Greenhills was like having your own model town with no real outside interference,” he recalled. Also that the Greenhills Pioneers were “real” people and everyone felt a part of the community.

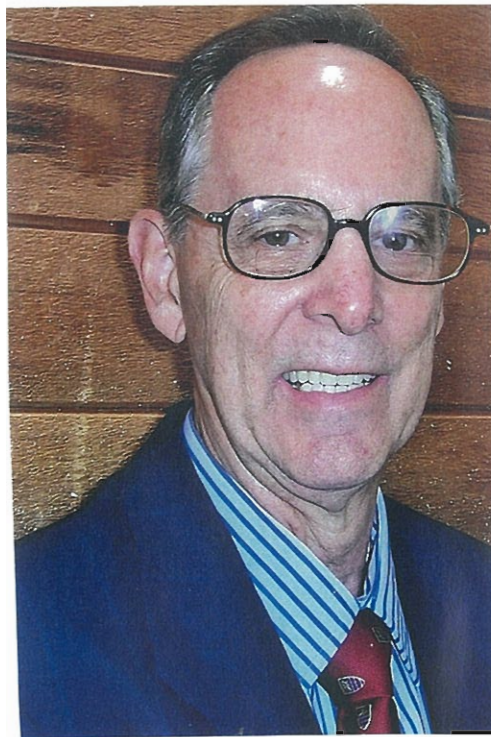
Today this busy man enjoys creating new businesses, golfing, biking, swimming, traveling, coaching basketball teams, helping small businesses with marketing, fund-raising for various charities, and dodging hurricanes! He was a chaplain at the New York Presbyterian Hospital in N.Y.C. and he works with Fr. Champigny at St. Jude Catholic Church in Boca Raton.

He has no intention of retiring as he is still President/CEO of The Charter Group and going strong.

When asked about this honor, he replied, "It meant much more than I originally thought. It brought back many memories, and I was very glad to see so many friends at the event. Looking back, I appreciate growing up in Greenhills much, much more. Just let everyone know how much I love Greenhills! P.S. In my opinion, the #1 Hall of Famer is Tom MacDonald."

His motto of "Under Promise and Over Produce" speaks volumes about Terry who quipped, "I have done nothing with a worldwide impact, but I'm still working on it!"

Best wishes on that goal and welcome to the Hall of Fame.

Our high school was opened in the fall of 1938 after the completion of the Village. Gladys Craig, Hallie Bowling, Ruth Colby, Richard Recher, Jimmy Gible, and Klaine Landers represented our first senior class, We believe that Ruth Colby is the only living member from that class. Ruth's father, Albert Colby, was the first Mayor of Greenhills.

The class of 1991 had 110 members. As was stated in the '91 yearbook, "The last of the Pioneers showed great spirit in all their endeavors. In the hearts of this last class, the Pioneer spirit will live forever".

Our final varsity basketball team finished the season ranked the number one Division II team in Cincinnati. They tied for the league championship, won the district tournament and were regional runner-ups. A photo of this team is displayed in the Alumni Pioneer Room.
